I along with so many of you continue to grieve the senseless mass murder of children in Texas on Tuesday afternoon. I think it important for you to be aware that as a pastor who is often looked to for appropriate words, today I don't have words, but I have feelings. My feelings are of grief and anger as yet again our country bears witness to mass murder by a person with a gun.

In two weeks, we have collectively witnessed the murder of 10 black women and men who were shopping for groceries and 19 children and 2 teachers who were enjoying their last week of the school year.

**Please know that I am praying alongside each of you.** At the same time, I am asking God to lead me into my response to do what I can do and to use my voice to prevent these mass murders from happening again.

Peace be upon each of you as collectively we grieve again.



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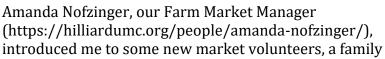
A Note from Beth Latella

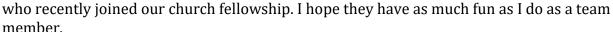
Dear Friends,

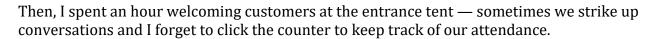
